GIVING TO THE WORK OF THE CHURCH



The work of the church in spreading the good news of the Gospel is dependent on the generosity of its members, who contribute with their time and financially. The elders are very aware of how the cost of living is affecting everyone and are very grateful to those who give as they are able.

Some choose to give regularly to the work of the church using Freewill Offering Envelopes. If you already do this, you will automatically be provided with a set of envelopes for 2025. These will be available for collection on Sunday 1 December. If you have given this way in the past, but do not want envelopes for 2025, or if you have not used envelopes in the past and would like to, please speak to Gail Alexander as soon as possible.

Many choose to give by Standing Order directly from their bank to the church bank account. This is a very convenient method both for the giver and for the church as it saves the giver sorting out cash, and the Treasurer's team counting it. If you would like to use this method and have not already set it up, please speak to Gail or to our Treasurer, John Ralfe, to find out more. A standing order can be changed or cancelled only by you at any time.

Please remember also that if you are a tax payer, the HMRC Gift Aid Scheme allows us to claim back 25 pence for every pound you give. This makes a huge difference to our income. Speak to Gail if you would like to find out more.

All giving is treated confidentially with only the Treasurer, John, and the Gift Aid Convenor, Gail, knowing the amount you give.

Welcome Group

Over the past few weeks, beyond the tea, coffee and fellowship, the focus has been on hearing something of the history of Blythswood Care, and particularly the development of its Christmas Shoebox Appeal (see article below). Additionally, in this 150th Anniversary of the start of the Leprosy Mission, learning more about the ongoing work of this organisation has been of great interest and the group decided to give the "Gift of a Cure from Leprosy" to two people this Christmas. The opportunity has also been given to others in the Church Family to order cards and presents with several taking the opportunity to 'gift' wheelchairs, sight, chickens and the like as an alternative to traditional Christmas presents. Over £1,500 of sales has been achieved.



Blythswood Care started in Glasgow in 1966 with a focus on sharing the Gospel, through witness and caring service. The Christmas Shoebox Appeal with which many are familiar began in 1993 with 300 gift-wrapped, gift- filled boxes given to children in Romanian orphanages. Since then, 2.6 million boxes have been distributed to people in Eastern Europe.

This year, the generous donations of the Craigowl Church family, has enabled 101 boxes to be filled and despatched along with crocheted/knitted blankets, other items and £350 towards the cost

of transportation. This is all part of our 'reaching out' and thanks are due to all who contributed as well as those who undertook the wrapping and filling of the boxes.

<u>Seeking a Minister – Appointment of a Nominating Committee</u>

We are approaching the stage whereby the congregation will have the opportunity to elect a Nominating Committee. It will be the role of this group to look for and recommend one person deemed to be suitable to be the minister of Craigowl Church.

On Sunday 1st December, following our morning worship, the congregation will be invited to meet for the purpose of electing 11 people to form a Nominating Committee. Obviously, this will take some time, so please be prepared to stay until the process is complete. To help, here is some information regarding how the process works and explaining the commitment involved in being part of the Nominating Committee.

The Process

- The maximum number of members is 11.
- In the event of more than 11 individuals being nominated, a vote will be held. The vote will take the form of a secret ballot with each member or adherent listed on our electoral roll being able to allocate a single vote to up to



- 11 of those nominated. You do not have to use all the 11 votes available to you. You can allocate only one vote to any of the individuals listed on the ballot paper.
- Any person on our electoral roll can be nominated. However, that person
 must have indicated that they are willing to put themselves forward for
 election. The person being nominated is not required to be in attendance on
 1st December, but the person nominating and the required seconder does
 need to be present at the meeting
- Only those in attendance at the meeting on 1st December can vote. There is no option to record proxy votes.
- The 11 nominees accumulating the highest number of votes will form the Nominating Committee. If there is a tie for the last place, a further vote will be taken between or among those tying.
- The names of those elected to form the Nominating Committee will be announced following completion of the voting and counting process and prior to the conclusion of the meeting.

Role and Commitment

- The Nominating Committee operates completely independently of the Kirk Session.
- The Kirk Session has prepared a Parish Profile which offers any prospective minister information regarding the present life, work and witness of the congregation. In addition, this document provides detail of vision and plans for the future together with some information around what we might expect from and what we might offer to our minister.
- Perth Presbytery have in place a Vacancy Advisory Committee who will meet with the Nominating Committee and, along with the Interim Moderator, offer them appropriate guidance and advice.
- Being part of the Nominating Committee does require a time commitment.
 There will be a need to consider the process for inviting applications, written applications will need consideration, potential candidates will require to be interviewed and there may be a need to visit candidates in their own situation. These are just some of the likely requirements. However, the way the recruitment process is taken forward is in the hands of those who form the Nominating Committee.

Some may feel a sense of inadequacy about undertaking such a responsibility; nonetheless and as The Church of Scotland states in its guidance, the task should be approached with a mixture of humility and confidence.

It's great to be able to report that this activity, which takes place on Tuesday mornings and evenings is proving to be popular. So much so that participation is at capacity.






A nice comfortable (and warm) space to enjoy the bowling and the fellowship.

Financial Report

Our treasurer, John Ralfe writes,

As we all know, on 1st July ,Chalmers Ardler and Strathmartine churches joined together to become Craigowl Church of Scotland,



At this stage it is difficult to project with great accuracy what the final figures for 2024 will look like, but suffice to say for now that our combined funds will show a healthy balance as we head into 2025. Our current level of cash and investments stand at £328k.

Since July, we have continued to produce monthly accounts for review and consideration by the Kirk Session and this practice will continue to be followed. We will update you with our closing position and our plans for 2025 in due course.

2025 - The Future

We will shortly be putting together our financial plan for 2025 which is likely to include a provisional estimated costing for the appointment of a new minister. It is highly likely that our planned expenditure for 2025 will exceed our income, but I am confident that the good husbandry that we have shown in the past will result in any deficit being kept to a minimum.

We endeavour to ensure that our membership records are up to date - in this regard we



need your help. If your address or telephone number changes, please let us know. It's possible that you haven't given us a note of your telephone number – if you think this might be your situation, please provide us with the relevant telephone number(s).
